

5.0 Consultation

Extensive consultation has been carried out with the Carterton community since April 2008. This has included consultation with both landowners, and the wider community through meetings, open days, *charrettes*, and submissions. Pupils of Southend Primary School also attended an Open Day in April 2008 to provide their perspective on development, giving valuable insight into the need for walking/cycling friendly connections and recreation space/facilities.

A table identifying the key stages of consultation undertaken during the development of the Structure Plan is given below (right). Updates have also been included in the Carterton Crier at intervals throughout the process.

Opportunities were given at the 2008 Open Week and 2009 Charrette for landowners and community members to 'draw-up' their own perspectives on how the structure plan should look.

A summary of the feedback received from consultation is provided in the Part C Appendix to this report. In essence the community recognised the need to have a structure plan to provide coordinated and cohesive development in Carterton South. Principal matters of concern were the level of density, the need to retain a semi-rural 'character', and the need to avoid rat-running or 'boy-racer' problems in new streets where these connected through. Walking and cycling connections were also considered particularly important.

Submissions were received on two separate dates, most recently at the end of June 2009. Quantifiable feedback was also received at the June 2009 *charrete*, where attendees were asked to rank issues identified in previous consultation. The respective rankings are given in the table below. This valuable exercise served to again highlight the importance of providing walking

and cycling connections, retaining a semi-rural character, and slowing down traffic. Drainage and servicing issues were the next ranked.

Significantly much of this feedback relates to development in the public realm, particularly within the road corridors, and specific design treatment was suggested at the *charrette*. These designs in the form of developmental cross-sections received considerable support, and have been adopted with only minor modification, refer to section 9.0 and Part Three.

Information Sheet updates and the Carterton Crier provided a means for members of the community to remain updated on the structure plan project at important stages in its development.
